Andy Cooley, to locate a generous businessman and his son with tractor-trailer trucks who transported a donated three-ton skid loader from Pennsylvania to Arizona for Calvary Indian Mission in New Mexico.

In spite of a brutal sandstorm, a determined twelve-man team, breathing through handkerchiefs and working in shifts, plodded and persisted to hand-dig a 100 foot trench. There they buried the electrical supply line to power a recently-donated modular school building for Calvary Indian Mission and School in New Mexico being renovated by this same Mission Helps work crew.

At the center of this Servant issue is a straightforward, practical missionary prayer guide. This prayer calendar is the result of many hours devoted by Heidi Hoffman, Graphic Designer. She resolutely pressed on and persisted to create a concise but powerful monthly prayer platform to aid in praying effectively for missionaries.

William Carey had it right, "I can plod. I can persevere in any definite pursuit. To this I owe everything." The story of his fruitful life and ministry to India is proof. Prevailing against insurmountable obstacles and the disheartening apathy of a society dominated by indifference, he became known by many as "the father of modern missions."

FAITHFUL THROUGH VEHICLE SERVICES

We call her Bertha...that's the name given to the Mission Helps' large van, a Ford E-150 model. While Bertha's gas mileage is not as good as the fleet's Honda Odyssey minivans, she does serve some important purposes.

Bertha is a great vehicle for bigger families, offering much-needed space for luggage, display materials, and other unique options afforded by a larger van. One missionary couple traveling on deputation with their children fondly referred to Bertha as their "mobile home-school."

With the aft bench seat removed, Bertha offers ample space for hauling mission cargo. This past June, Tim and Sharron Teed, recently-commissioned missionaries to Slovakia under Hope International Missions, completed a year of deputation using one of Mission Helps' Honda Odyssey minivans. Flying out of Newark Airport in New Jersey, the Teeds needed transportation not only for themselves, their little dog Harper, and their luggage, but also for fourteen totes filled with supplies. All of this required more space than a minivan affords.

Bertha to the rescue! Removing the aft bench seat provided enough room for the Teeds, their dog Harper, their luggage, and the fourteen totes to be transported from Lebanon, PA to the Newark Airport. The Teeds and Harper, their baggage, and the totes all arrived together in Slovakia! The Mission Helps vehicle fleet currently consists of seven vans: Bertha, the larger Ford van, and six Honda Odyssey minivans. These vehicles are maintained by Ron Shaffer at his service facility in Manheim, PA, and are available to holiness missionaries for their transportation needs while home from the fields.

It's the busy mother working for general services and fielding calls. It's the difficult requests that take time and ingenuity to solve. It's learning new things, networking, and contacting new people. It's trying to keep the kids quiet during lengthy phone calls that continued on page 12

FAITHFUL DETERMINED PERSEVERANCE

"Beep! Beep!" my phone notified me of a text message.

"Hello Holly," I read. "Please call missionaries, Seth and Melody Yates. They need a driver and truck to deliver a 3-ton skid loader from Leba-

non, Pennsylvania, to New Mexico. Hoping General Services can help them out!" I had to blink a couple of times. That was a tall order!

I spent a little time thinking and praying about it. As I was leaving church on a Wednesday evening, I jokingly said to my pastor, Andy Cooley, "How would you like to take a trip to New Mexico to check on the Free Trinity Navajo Mission there? After all, you are a board member there."

He inquired as to why I was asking. I explained the situation to him. Pastor Cooley responded, "Let me make some phone calls." About a week later I was told that if we could get the skid loader to Bedford, Pennsylvania, that it could be transported to New Mexico. Dennis Gardner, Jr., owner of Esh's Storage Barns and president of Free Trinity Navajo Mission, has trucks that run from Pennsylvania to Arizona. The Yates said that they could get it from Arizona to their mission in New Mexico, about a three-hour trip.

We worked on several different angles to get the skid loader transported to Bedford. When Joe Gardner,

Dennis Gardner's son, heard what was happening, he volunteered to go get it from Lebanon. He wanted to be a blessing to the Yates because Melody Yates had been his teacher and had tutored him in algebra when he lived in New Mexico. So, he took a truck and trailer, picked up the skid loader in Lebanon, and transported it to Bedford. From there it was loaded on a trailer with some sheds bound for Arizona. The Yates met the truck in Arizona.

Today, the skid loader is a blessing to the mission there in New Mexico thanks to all of God's people working together to be a blessing.

The team installed new windows and electric, water, and propane lines. They patched drywall, painted, installed cove base, and replaced old lighting with new. Before leaving, the team hauled long ACE office desks to the new building. Just a few days later, teachers and students were moving into their new school and enjoying the spacious room and beautiful lighting!

The team was especially grateful to the Lord for helping them find a much needed but obsolete electrical breaker box right under their noses in the very classroom they were renovating! It was a special miracle. The students learned to love the Lucas girls and Anna who kept busy that week helping the students with their studies, telling stories for chapel, and helping with the cooking. Some of the young Navajo students got to help carry flooring or try to use a caulk gun! One unusual challenge to the team was the Tuesday dust storm which blew sand into the windows, into everyone's eyes, and everywhere the team was working outdoors!
